Land Sales Update

We are delighted to announce that Larkfields and Woodlands Edge have been sold to Bloor Homes.

We look forward to welcoming the Bloor Homes team to Larkfields and Woodlands Edge in the spring next year.


The two phases will bring an additional 277 homes to the site. 40% of these will be a combination of shared ownership and affordable rent.

We will be looking to sell further phases early next year.

Grainger Plc is the master developer of the site. We own the land and sell phases to house builders, manage the green spaces, infrastructure, and legal obligations with the local authorities. We work closely with many different consultants and partners to ensure Berewood is a wonderful place to live, not just for people but also the local wildlife.

Current Timescales

Please note these dates are estimates only and subject to change

- Next housebuilders on site (Larkfields & Woodlands Edge) Spring 2022
- Berewood Town Park second phase (including cricket pavilion) to commence Spring 2022 estimated completion 2025
- Elements of the Local Centre delivered within next 5 years (not including Health Centre and Extra Care facility which are subject to NHS and Hampshire County Council, timescales still to be confirmed)
- Marrelsmoor Avenue connection works to start spring 2022, complete spring 2024
- Southern Access Junction (Ladybridge Roundabout) work anticipated to start Sept 2022
- Second Primary School complete and open Sept 2024





Resident Survey Responses

Your recent Travel & Community Survey responses are helping to shape the future of the development

We'd like to say a big Thank You to everyone who took the time to complete this year's resident survey.

The results from the 2021 survey identified that 81% of residents main mode of travel was by private car, with 74% of residents stating their reason for this was because it is more reliable and quicker than alternatives.

We hope that with future bus routes and cycle paths this number will decrease over time.

As part of the survey, residents were also asked what improvements they would like to see.

Key issues/actions were:

- On-street parking
- Traffic calming measures
- More information on timescales for work on site





Parking

We have painted yellow lines on Grainger Street, Newlands Avenue and Milk Lane which has helped reduce nuisance parking on those roads.

A permanent car park will be built as part of the second phase of Berewood Town Park which will stop visitors using residential roads for parking when the current temporary car park is full. We expect this to be complete in 2025.

Once roads are adopted by Hampshire County Council they, along with the police, will be able to enforce any restrictions and issue fines.

We hope to have the spine roads (Grainger Street, Newlands Avenue, Houghton Avenue) adopted by the end of 2022.

Should you have issues with vehicles blocking your drive so that you cannot access, you can report this to the police as this is an offence.

Traffic Calming

We have placed temporary speed bumps along the construction routes to help combat speeding vehicles. We are looking at alternative solutions for residential roads such as Grainger Street.

Once more of the development is built the traffic flows will change and improve, but we are looking into solutions for these issues in the meantime.

Timescales

Sadly the past 18 months of a pandemic coupled with Brexit has meant long delays to our schedule of works, as well as landscape maintenance and improvements such as signage.

Things are once again starting to move forward and we will endeavour to communicate updates through our newsletters, social media and website. We would like to thank you for your patience during a time which has, and continues to be, difficult for everyone.

Wildlife Update

More new species spotted along the River Wallington

We are thrilled that for the very first time fish are living in the river, and so a kingfisher has also made itself at home!

These beautiful birds are actually extremely tiny and very fast, reaching up to 25 miles per hour so you may just catch a glimpse of electric blue as they flash past.

So far the best place to spot our newest resident is along the western section of the river.

Did you know...?

- Kingfisher courtship occurs in spring. The male will approach the female with a fish and attempt to feed it to her.
- The design of a kingfisher's beak is so aerodynamically efficient that they slice soundlessly through water without alerting fish. Engineers working on Japan's high-speed bullet train copied the shape of this beak to prevent sonic boom whenever these fast-moving trains enter a tunnel.
- Kingfishers do not build a nest, instead they nest inside a tunnel, which is typically around 30-90cm in length, located next to a river bank.


As this was the first event of its kind we have run at Berewood, it was wonderful that all the activites were so popular and we will certainly be looking to provide more in future.


Autumn Cycling

Make the most of the cycle routes on site and locally across Waterlooville

If there's one positive thing that can be taken from the events of the past 18 months, it's the number of people that have discovered the benefits of cycling, whether to work or school, for fitness or fun.

Here are our top tips for cycling over the next few months through autumn and into winter:

- 1. Safety first Wear warm and reflective clothing and use lights, reflectors and a helmet
- 2. Take it slow- If you're just starting out, take a short, trafficfree route to boost your confidence on the bike first
- 3. Service your bike Keep your bike road worthy with regular checks and services (Halfords provide free bike checks www.halfords.com)
- 4. Use a mudguard Helps keep you clean and dry when cycling in wetter weather
- Plan ahead Use sites like www.cyclestreets.net to plan your journey, customising the route to your fitness level and desired level of traffic





First Bus Space Checker

A brand new tool to help you travel with confidence

Space Checker allows you to see how busy your bus stop will be, helping you choose a quieter time to travel if needed.

Designed using recent passenger data, this new platform acts as a prediction of how much space will be available on your service - up to 7 days in advance.

As we navigate through working from home, flexible working and ever changing leisure needs, this service will help you travel safely whilst reducing emissions.

All you need to do is simply select which bus service you want to take, select the direction in which you are travelling and then select your stop. Space Checker will then indicate the busiest periods for the service and stop, whilst also providing alternative services.

The play area was designed with Berewood Primary School pupils who chose a theme featuring boats, as well as a zip wire, slides, swings, and areas to climb on.


Accessible play equipment has been installed so all children can enjoy the facility, regardless of age or ability.

Think Before You Park

Parking on pavements is more dangerous than you might think

Parking on the pavements forces pedestrians into the path of oncoming traffic. This is particularly dangerous for people with sight loss who are unable to see moving vehicles but also those with reduced mobility, wheelchair or mobility scooter users and parents with young children or buggies.

Vehicles parked on pavement surfaces cause them to crack and tarmac surfaces to subside, in some cases even damaging pipes laid beneath the surface. Local authorities spent over £1billion on repairing kerbs, pavements and walkways between 2006 and 2010 alone. This is all paid for by your council tax.

Please be considerate of your community and make sure your vehicle is parked on a road and not a pavement. Whilst other vehicles may have to wait to drive around, a few extra seconds is better than the more dangerous alternative for pedestrians.
